David Lawler

David Lawler is the Chief Executive Officer of BP's US Lower 48 (L48) Onshore exploration and production business and a Director on the Board of BP America Production Company.

Headquartered in Denver, the L48 business operates across five states from Texas north through the Rocky Mountains and produces approximately 300 mboed from interests in over 20,000 wells.

David joined BP in September 2014 from SandRidge Energy, Inc., (NYSE:SD) a US—based oil and gas independent headquartered in Oklahoma City, where he served as Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer. Prior to

joining SandRidge in 2011, David was the Chief Executive Officer and President of PostRock Energy Corporation (NYSE:PSTRQ) and its predecessor entities where he worked for four years.

David began his career as a production engineer with Conoco and later joined Burlington Resources where he served in drilling engineering and well site leadership positions. He then spent 10 years with Shell Exploration and Production Company in a series of roles with increasing responsibility, including business planning for the Americas and engineering and operations manager for the US Gulf Coast business unit.

In addition to his role with BP, David serves as a board member for the Texas Oil & Gas Association and the Mewbourne College of Petroleum at the University of Oklahoma. David served as a director of PennTex Midstream Partners, LP (NASDAQ:PTXP) and as a member of the Audit Committee from 2015 until its sale to Energy Transfer Partners, LP in 2017.

David graduated from the Colorado School of Mines with a Bachelor of Science in Petroleum Engineering and earned his Master of Business Administration from Tulane University.

Donald E. Campbell is an Associate Professor of Law at Mississippi College School of Law, where he teaches courses including Ethics and Professional Responsibility, Property, Wills and Estates, Immigration Law, and Construction Law. He received his undergraduate degree from the University of Southern Mississippi, and his J.D. *summa cum laude* from Mississippi College School of Law. 
George Snell, TX

George was born in Pampa, Gray County, Texas. He attended Baylor University and Baylor Law School graduating in 1972 with BA and JD degrees. Since 1972, George has practiced law in Amarillo. He maintained a general practice, including litigation, until 1979. In1979, George joined an attorney who had been preparing title opinions for oil and gas purposes since 1966. George also limited his practice to the oil and gas and real property areas, focusing primarily on the preparation of title opinions for all purposes. George and his former partner, now deceased, have together prepared over 8,000 title opinions.

From 1985 to 1991, he was one of the team of speakers teaching AAPL's Certification Review course. He taught NADOA's Certification Review course from 1993 to 1996. George has spoken at many other industry seminars for landmen, division order analysts and bar associations. Many of his articles have been published in The Landman.

Since 1989, George has served on the Texas Bar's Title Standards Joint Editorial Board. The purpose of title standards is to summarize the law on real property subject and provide practical solutions to common conveyance problems. All real estate practitioners, including oil and gas practitioners, should be familiar with the title standards of any state there they conduct business. While George is not a member of a firm in the traditional sense, George has put together a network of title lawyers representing 21 states who work together for both business and writing purposes. The lawyers have written articles comparing the oil and gas law of their state to Texas, using the same format as in the prototype article written in 1989, which compares the oil and gas law of Oklahoma to Texas. AAPL published the first 18 articles in a two volume set in mid-2011. One volume integrated all 18 articles by the 180+ topics, while the other volume contains each state's article in full. The 2nd Edition is in progress.

As a solo practitioner, George has more flexibility in administrative matters than a larger firm. For example, depending upon the volume of work to be done, he answers the phone either "Hard working lawyer's office" or "Hardly working lawyer's office"!



Craig Newman, WY

Craig Newman graduated from the University of Wyoming College of Law in 1975, where he was one of the editors of the Wyoming Land and Water Law Review. He has been oil and gas lawyer since 1976, in private practice since 1980, and a sole practitioner for 25 years.

For 38 years, he has regularly represented clients before the Wyoming Oil and Gas Conservation Commission and written title opinions for oil and gas clients. He is a member and former trustee of the Rocky Mountain Mineral Law Foundation and has written papers and made presentations at a


number of special institutes and one annual institute of the Foundation, including special institutes on title examination and oil and gas conservation law. He also is one of the original chapter authors in The Law of Federal Oil and Gas Leases, a two-volume legal treatise published by Matthew Bender and the Rocky Mountain Mineral Law Foundation.

He is the author of the Wyoming portion of OIL & GAS LAW, A NATIONWIDE COMPARISON OF LAWS ON LEASING, EXPLORATION AND PRODUCTION, published in 2010 by the American Association of Professional Landmen (AAPL) and has been a speaker and presenter at a previous AAPL Annual Meeting and special topic seminars.

He is a former Chairman of the Legal Committee of the Interstate Oil and Gas Compact Commission and was Wyoming's representative to the Compact for 8 years. He has been listed as a member of The Best Lawyers in America and in Martindale Hubbell's Bar Registry of Preeminent Lawyers, both for more than 25 years, and has been listed in Rocky Mountain Super Lawyers since 2008.

In October, 2017, Newman received the Wyoming State Bar's 7th Gerald R. Mason Professionalism Award, given annually to recognize an attorney whose career exemplifies the highest standards of professionalism and ethics.
